

Question #3: How many hours of your time have you spent on the technical transition so far? Please estimate the total number of hours per week that this new format will add to your normal prep time.

1. **Butte College**- About 4 for one class. Relatively easy for me since I have an online version of this course already.
2. **Butte College** - Just made their announcement yesterday, so I haven't even started there. I don't expect the change to add to my hourly time investment once the changes I'm contemplating are implemented.
3. **City College of San Francisco** - Can't answer. The time I have spent has been frustrating since the program does not appear as very intuitive.
4. **College of the Sequoias** - It's been about 10 hours so far that I've actively worked on the transition. It seems like more work because there are now many emails from my students due to no face-to-face class time. This new format is adding about 5-10 hours to my weekly load.
5. **CSU Chico** - I think I've spent 20 hours on my Chico State course so far, and I'll spend another 20 to get the rest of my lectures taped and posted. No idea how much time I'll spend on revising assignments.
6. **CTA** - It's hard to estimate all the responses to emails from students. But roughly 3 hours. Plus, the making of packets for my incarcerated students.
7. **Diablo Valley College** - It's ongoing because it is a work in progress. First of all, it's all the prep time to figure out how you are going to cover and do the same coursework that needed to be done in person, meet current standards, and meet expectations. Then it's all the time to do the modifications and create more materials in Canvas. Then it's all the time to make this work for students and assess if further modifications or improvements must be made. It essentially means that even for one course, you are working full time on that course, hoping that you get to keep teaching the course in the new format to make up for the cost of these changes and improvements. Plus, from the college president to the dean on down, you are made to feel that all faculty not already teaching a designated online course are in essence not trusted by the administration to be competent sufficiently to do it without their oversight regardless of experience. Our union agreed to a change of job qualifications for teaching online without any input from all PT faculty and in such a way that even if you are teaching an online or hybrid class but don't additionally pass a very subjective training course without pay, your job can be eliminated. But then the corona virus happened, and everyone had to move their otherwise not online courses to fully online within days.
8. **Diablo Valley College** - Not many extra hours of prep. About 5 hours to convert DVDs to MP4s and loading them to storage site.
9. **Grossmont College** -They said about six to eight hours.
